What you need to know about the Nov. 3 Presidential Election

Virginians will be voting for:

- President and Vice President
- U.S. Senator from Virginia (one)
- U.S. House of Representatives (all districts)
- State constitutional amendments that would:
 - Create a redistricting commission to draw congressional and state legislative maps
 - Exempt disabled veterans from paying motor vehicle property tax
- For City of Richmond residents only: Mayor; City Council and School Board (all)

Absentee, mail-in, and early voting are open to all, no excuse needed. Act early to make sure your vote is counted!

Important deadlines to make sure your vote is counted:

- Register to vote or update your registration **NOW until Oct. 13**
- Request absentee mail-in ballot online or by mail **NOW until 5 p.m. Oct. 23**
 - Requested absentee ballots will be mailed beginning **Sept. 18**
- Vote early in-person between **Sept. 18 and Oct. 31**
- Postmark completed ballot or return in person to your [registrar](#) by **7 p.m. Nov. 3**
 - Mailed ballot must be received by registrar by **noon Nov. 6**
- Vote in person at your polling place **6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Nov. 3**

NEW! Drop boxes for completed mail-in ballots will be available at registrar, satellite and polling locations. Check with your registrar for times and locations.

Am I eligible to vote?

- Yes, if you are a citizen of the United States and resident of Virginia, at least 18-years-old by Nov. 3, not currently declared mentally incompetent by a court of law, or had voting rights restored after a felony conviction (for help on how to restore voting rights, call the Commonwealth's Restoration Department at 804-692-0104 or visit <https://www.restore.virginia.gov/>)

How do I register to vote or update my registration?

- Online: <https://www.elections.virginia.gov/registration/>
- Registration applications can be obtained at any of the following:
 - Virginia departments of Elections, Motor Vehicles, Health, Social Services, Aging and Rehabilitative Services, Deaf and Hard of Hearing, Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, Blind and Vision Impaired
 - Virginia Board for People with Disabilities
 - Regional offices of the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries
 - Armed Forces Recruitment Offices
 - Public libraries
- When you register, the local General Registrar will notify you by mail of your registration status. If you have not received notification, you can check your status at: www.elections.virginia.gov/citizen-portal
- If you cannot confirm your registration online, call your local General Registrar (find at: www.elections.virginia.gov/LocalGR)

What documents do I need to cast a ballot?

- Photo ID is no longer required at the polls, however, you will need some form of ID
- Acceptable ID documents are:
 - Voter information card or other correspondence from your local General Registrar confirming you are registered to vote
 - DMV-issued driver's license or ID card
 - U.S. passport or any ID card issued by U.S., Virginia or local Virginia government
 - Any student ID card issued by a U.S. university, community college or Va. high school
 - Employer-issued photo ID card
 - Any current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document with your name and address

How do I know my mail-in ballot was received?

- You can track your ballot at www.elections.virginia.gov/citizen-portal
- If you have any questions about it being received, you can call your General Registrar (find at www.elections.virginia.gov/LocalGR)
- Important: When you mail your ballot, you have voted. Be sure your ballot is accurate, complete and signed before you mail it, or your vote will not be counted!

How can I request curbside voting?

- If you are 65 or older or have a physical disability, you may vote on Election Day without leaving your vehicle. Please bring a helper to request curbside assistance from an election officer.
